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“Active Archive” is the Right Answer for Cincinnati Children’s

DataArk® allowed Cincinnati Children’s, a southwest Ohio medical center, to retire its old HIS without interruption to cash flow.



Cincinnati Children’s Hospital Medical Center is a full-service, not-for-profit pediatric organization that has forged an international reputation for advanced research and progressive teaching programs. The medical center has made its mark nationally with the Cincinnati Children’s Research Foundation, one of the largest pediatric research programs in the United States.

CHALLENGE

After deciding to implement a new health information system (HIS), Cincinnati Children’s needed an immediate plan to maintain real-time access to old account data prior to the expiration of its current HIS vendor contract. It was also crucial that account billing continue without interruption to cash flow.

After attempts to negotiate a favorable extension of the existing HIS contract proved unsuccessful, the medical center considered devising its own data storage solution, but deemed the anticipated expense and resulting burden on IT staff too great.

Mike Taylor, Vice President of Revenue Cycle Management, then launched a rigorous search for a third-party vendor that would help keep the imminent HIS conversion on track and within budget.

SOLUTION

Referrals led Tony Helton, Executive Director of Hospital Billing Operations, to MediQuant®, Inc. Helton was presented with DataArk®—an “active archive” that could serve as a repository for old records while allowing hospital staff to continue to manage and bill active accounts.

Keeping up obsolete legacy systems to maintain receivables functions and real-time access to account level detail can be excessive – like using a bulldozer to plow a garden. MediQuant® developed DataArk® to help organizations achieve a seamless and cost-effective changeover to a new HIS or EMR.



"We were approached by a number of vendors, none having what we considered a true 'system solution,'" said Helton. "Most volunteered to work the legacy A/R for us, but we weren't comfortable with allowing that level of access to the system. How to transfer the data, then pull everything back in, was also a concern."

"That's when we decided DataArk® was the answer."

IMPLEMENTATION

After "go-live" of Cincinnati Children's new HIS, the old system was kept running for a transition period of six months. During this time, much of the legacy A/R was worked down. Active and non-active accounts were then migrated into DataArk® from two large databases containing records from a 500-bed hospital and from more than 500 physicians.

Data elements retained their original format, thus retaining familiarity to the end user in DataArk®. Coupled with the software's intuitive design, staff needed less than one hour of training on average to learn the new system. Users could now easily view patient account detail on all active and archived accounts, and post payments to accounts with balances being updated through DataArk®.

"The fact that we did not get a lot of feedback meant it went well. Everyone was comfortable with it," said Charlie Baverman, Assistant Vice President of Revenue Cycle Management.

OBSTACLES

Cincinnati Children's unique data models posed a challenge to MediQuant® during the implementation of DataArk®. The medical center had built several interfaces to pass data back-and-forth with outsourced service providers including a healthcare financial staffing agency that had been contracted to help liquidate the legacy A/R.

"It was critical to get active patient billing out of our shop and over to the receivables management firm quickly so that our staff could focus on the future," said Baverman. "The exchange of transactional data such as payments, refunds and adjustments had to be fluid. Our answer was to combine the horsepower of the receivables management firm's collection system with the integrated functionality of the MediQuant® archive."

DataArk® served as the "system of record" for the daily flow of notes and transactions generated between the medical center and the receivables management firm as well as a debt collection agency and other vendors that provided revenue enhancement and out-of-state Medicaid services.

More than 80% of the work Cincinnati Children's did with its vendors during this time was interfaced through DataArk®.

"Agency update files were passed between DataArk® and the agencies," said Jim Vonderhaar, Senior Director of Application Services. "There were no surprises anytime we went into the system. We were extremely impressed by the accuracy."



OUTCOMES

Cincinnati Children's saved nearly \$800,000 in legacy system support fees alone during its first year with DataArk®.

Most importantly, hospital and physician billing continued without interruption during implementation of the new HIS.

The medical center has since launched a second project with DataArk®, this time to migrate legacy anesthesia data.

"I've talked to CFOs at other hospitals and told them, in terms of a cost-effective solution to your legacy system, DataArk® is the best answer you could come up with," said Taylor. "We would have been in a pricey bind if we had been forced to extend our old system contract or develop a warehousing solution internally. Those were really the only options we had until DataArk®, which presented a much better economic model for us."
